1. Introduction
The research project "Invisible childhoods: Contributions to innovative and plural
educational practices" builds on the outcomes of previous research on the theme of
continuity in 0-10 years education, which was jointly conducted by the University of
Milano-Bicocca and Campinas University (Unicamp, São Paulo, Brazil).
The earlier study showed that in the education of children from birth to ten years, in
both the Italian and Brazilian country contexts, difference - in terms of social class,
gender, age, culture, ethnic/racial identity, and language - is a crucial recurrent
theme for both children's education itself and the professional development of early
childhood educators and teachers.
Differences are of new and particular importance in light of the ongoing COVID-19
public health emergency, which has brought to the fore and exacerbated the
sociocultural conflicts, dichotomies, and difficulties that affect children and lead to
them become (in)visible.
In Italy, during the closure of ECEC services and schools and the consequent
implementation of the "DaD" and "Lead" distance education programmes, children
 were abruptly plunged into an almost exclusively domestic existence, and withdrawn
from the public life of their communities. This situation demonstrated even more
tangibly than before that children do not have a place of their own within the everyday
daily life of the broader community, but rather tend to be placed (or might we say
